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## SM.1. ERGODICITY AND STATIONARITY

$\operatorname{LET}\left(\zeta_{t}\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$ be a Markov chain with transition kernel $\zeta \mapsto \mathbb{P}(\zeta, \cdot) \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{Z})$ and $\zeta_{t} \in \mathbb{Z} \subseteq$ $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ for some $d>0$. Also, for any probability measure $P$ over $\mathbb{Z}$ and any $f: \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$, let $P[f](z) \equiv \int f(u) P(z, d u)$ (if it exists).

Assumption 9: There exist constants $\gamma \in(0,1), \lambda \in(0,1), b>0$ and $R>2 b /(1-\gamma)$, a function $\mathbf{V}: \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow[1, \infty)$, and a probability measure $\varrho$ such that: $(i) \mathbb{P}[\mathbf{V}](\zeta) \leq \gamma \mathbf{V}(\zeta)+$ b1 $\{\zeta \in \mathcal{C}\}$ for all $\zeta \in \mathbb{Z}$ with $\mathcal{C} \equiv\{\zeta \in \mathbb{Z}: \mathbf{V}(\zeta) \leq R\} ;($ ii $) \inf _{\zeta \in \mathcal{C}} \mathbb{P}(\zeta, \cdot) \geq \lambda \varrho(\cdot)$, with $\varrho(\mathcal{C})>$ 0 .

The next result is used for the proof of Lemma 1 ; it contains well-known results that are stated and proved here for convenience. In particular, the first part of Lemma 10 is a restatement of Theorem 1.2 in Hairer and Mattingly (2011). The second part of Lemma 10 and Assumption 9(ii) imply that $\mathbb{P}$ is Harris recurrent (see Athreya and Lahiri (2006, Ch. 14)) and aperiodic (see Thierney (1996, p. 65)). The proof follows from standard arguments.

Let $v \mapsto\|v\|_{\mathbf{v}} \equiv \sup _{\zeta} \frac{|v(\zeta)|}{1+\mathbf{V}(\zeta)}$. Also, for any $A \subseteq \mathbb{Z}$, let $T_{A}=\inf \left\{t \geq 0: \zeta_{t} \in A\right\}$. Finally, for any two sequences $\left(X_{n}\right)_{n}$ and $\left(Y_{n}\right)_{n}$, write $X_{n} \precsim Y_{n}$ if $X_{n} \leq C Y_{n}$ for some universal positive finite constant $C$.

LEMMA 10: If Assumption 9 holds, then:
(i) $\mathbb{P}$ admits a unique invariant measure $\nu^{*}$, and there exist constants $\gamma \in(0,1)$ and $C>0$ such that

$$
\left\|\mathbb{P}^{n}[v]-\nu^{*}[v]\right\|_{\mathbf{v}} \leq C \gamma^{n}\left\|v-\nu^{*}[v]\right\|_{\mathbf{v}}
$$

for every measurable function $v$ such that $\|v\|_{\mathbf{V}}<\infty$, where $\nu^{*}[v] \equiv \int v(\zeta) \nu^{*}(d \zeta)$.
(ii) $\mathbb{P}\left(\zeta,\left\{T_{\mathcal{C}}<\infty\right\}\right)=1$ for all $\zeta \in \mathbb{Z}$, and $\mathbb{P}\left(\zeta_{0}, \mathcal{C}\right)>0$ for all $\zeta_{0} \in \mathcal{C}$.

Proof of Lemma 10: The proof follows standard arguments and is thus omitted; it can be found in Pouzo, Psaradakis, and Sola (2021).

[^0]Proof of Lemma 1: Let $\left(\zeta_{t}\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$ be the stochastic process given by $\zeta_{t} \equiv\left(X_{t}, S_{t}\right)$. This process is a Markov chain with transition kernel $\mathbb{X} \times \mathbb{S} \ni \zeta \mapsto \mathbb{P}(\zeta, \cdot) \in \mathcal{P}(\mathbb{X} \times \mathbb{S})$ given by

$$
\mathbb{P}\left((x, s),\left\{\zeta_{t+1} \in A_{1} \times A_{2}\right\}\right)=\sum_{s^{\prime} \in A_{2}} Q_{*}\left(x, s, s^{\prime}\right) P_{*}\left(x, s^{\prime}, A_{1}\right)
$$

for any Borel sets $A_{1} \subseteq \mathbb{X}$ and $A_{2} \subseteq \mathbb{S}$.
By Lemma 10, there exists a unique invariant measure $\nu$, provided that the conditions of Assumption 9 are met. In order to verify the first part of Assumption 9, consider $\mathbf{V}(\zeta)=$ $\mathcal{U}(x)$, and $\mathcal{C} \equiv \mathcal{C}_{1} \times \mathbb{S}$ with $\mathcal{C}_{1} \equiv\{x \in \mathbb{X}: \mathcal{U}(x) \leq R\}$. By Assumption 2(i),

$$
\mathbb{P}[\mathbf{V}](\zeta)=\int_{\mathbb{X}} \mathcal{U}\left(x^{\prime}\right)\left\{\sum_{s^{\prime} \in \mathbb{S}} Q_{*}\left(x, s, s^{\prime}\right) P_{*}\left(x, s^{\prime}, d x^{\prime}\right)\right\} \leq \gamma \mathcal{U}(x)+2 b^{\prime} 1\left\{x \in \mathcal{C}_{1}\right\}
$$

Thus, $b \equiv 2 b^{\prime}$. Regarding Assumption 9(ii), observe that, by Assumption 1(i), for $C$ and any $s \in \mathbb{S}$,

$$
\mathbb{P}\left((x, s), C \times\left\{s^{\prime}\right\}\right) \geq \underline{q}(x) P_{*}\left(x, s^{\prime}, C\right)
$$

and, by Assumption 2(iii), $P_{*}\left(x, s^{\prime}, C\right) \geq \lambda^{\prime} \varpi(C)$ and $\lambda^{\prime} \in(0,1)$. Also note that, by Assumption $1, \underline{q}$ is continuous and $\underline{q}(x)>0$ for all $x \in \mathbb{X}$. Furthermore, by Assumption 2(ii), $\mathcal{U}$ is lower semicompact, because $\{x \in \mathbb{X}: \mathcal{U}(x) \leq R\}$ is closed $(x \mapsto \mathcal{U}(x)$ is lower semicontinuous), and is also bounded. Therefore, $\inf _{x: \mathcal{U}(x) \leq R} \underline{q}(x)=\min _{x: \mathcal{U}(x) \leq R} \underline{q}(x) \geq c>0$ (because it is a minimization of a continuous function on compact set). Therefore,

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\zeta, C \times\left\{s^{\prime}\right\}\right) \geq c \lambda^{\prime} \varpi(C) \frac{1}{|\mathbb{S}|}
$$

and, by putting $\varrho=\varpi(\cdot) \frac{1}{|S|}$ and $\lambda \equiv c \lambda^{\prime}$, Assumption 9(ii) follows since $\varpi\left(\mathcal{C}_{1}\right)>0$. Since $\nu$ is unique, it is trivially ergodic. Therefore, the process with initial probability measure $\nu$ is stationary. Ergodicity of $\left(\zeta_{t}\right)_{t}$ follows from Theorem 14.2.11 in Athreya and Lahiri (2006) (recall that $\mathbb{P}$ is Harris recurrent and aperiodic). Since $X_{t}$ is a deterministic function of $\zeta_{t}$, $X_{0}^{\infty}$ is also stationary and ergodic. Finally, observe that

$$
\int \sup _{0 \leq f \leq 1}\left|\mathbb{P}^{n}[f](\zeta)-\nu[f]\right| \nu(d \zeta) \precsim \gamma^{n} \int|1+\mathcal{U}(x)| \nu(d \zeta)
$$

Since $\mathcal{U}$ satisfies Assumption 9(i), it follows that $\int \mathbb{P}[\mathcal{U}](\zeta) \nu(d \zeta) \leq \gamma \nu[\mathcal{U}]+K$. Since $\nu$ is the invariant measure of $\mathbb{P}$ and $\gamma \in(0,1)$, this implies that $\nu(d \zeta) \leq K /(1-\gamma)$. Therefore,

$$
\int \sup _{0 \leq f \leq 1}\left|\mathbb{P}^{n}[f](\zeta)-\nu[f]\right| \nu(d \zeta) \precsim \gamma^{n}
$$

thereby implying that $\left(\zeta_{t}\right)_{t}$ is $\beta$-mixing with rate $\beta_{n}=O\left(\gamma^{n}\right)$ (see Davydov (1973)). Since $X_{t}$ is a deterministic function of $\zeta_{t}$, the same holds for $X_{0}^{\infty}$.

## SM.2. PROOFS OF SUPPLEMENTARY LEMMAS IN APPENDIX A. 1

To prove Lemmas 2 and 3, we use the following result.

Lemma 11: Suppose Assumptions 1 and 4(ii) hold. Then, for all $t \in \mathbb{N}$ and $-n \leq-m \leq$ $t-1$, a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$,

$$
\sup _{\theta \in \Theta}\left|\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}, \theta\right)\right| \leq C\left(X_{t-1}, X_{t}\right) \prod_{i=-m}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right) .
$$

Proof of Lemma 11: Observe that, for any $n \in \mathbb{N}$,

$$
\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}, \theta\right)=\log \sum_{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right) \bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(s \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)
$$

and since $\log x-\log y \leq x / y-1$, it suffices to study $\frac{\sum_{s \in S} P_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)\left(\overline{P_{\theta}^{\nu}}\left(S_{t}=s \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)-\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=s \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right)}{\sum_{s \in S} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right) \bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(s \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)}$. This expression can be bounded above by

$$
\frac{\max _{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)}{\min _{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)}\left\|\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)-\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right\|_{1}
$$

By Assumption 4(ii), $\sup _{\theta \in \Theta} \frac{\max _{s \in S} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)}{\min _{s \in S} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)} \leq C\left(X_{t-1}, X_{t}\right)$ a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$. So it suffices to bound $\left\|\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)-\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right\|_{1}$. By Lemma B.2.2 in Stachurski (2009) and the fact that $-n \leq-m$, this is bounded by

$$
\frac{1}{2} \sup _{b, c \in \mathbb{S}^{2}}\left\|\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid S_{-m}=b, X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)-\bar{P}_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(S_{t}=\cdot \mid S_{-m}=c, X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)\right\|_{1}
$$

Hence,

$$
\sup _{\theta \in \Theta}\left|\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}, \theta\right)\right| \leq C^{\prime} \alpha_{\theta, t,-m}\left(X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)
$$

where $\alpha_{\theta, t,-m}\left(X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)$ is defined in expression (12). By applying Lemmas 6 and 5 and the fact that $\alpha_{\theta, t,-m}\left(X_{-m}^{t-1}\right) \leq \prod_{j=-m}^{t-1} \alpha_{\theta, j, j+1}\left(X_{-m}^{t-1}\right)$, it follows that

$$
\sup _{\theta \in \Theta}\left|\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-m}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-\log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}, \theta\right)\right| \leq C\left(X_{t-1}, X_{t}\right) \prod_{i=-m}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right)
$$

a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$.

We now prove Lemmas 2 and 3 .
Proof of Lemma 2: The result follows from Lemma 11, with $m=0$ and $n=M$, and Assumption 5.

Proof of Lemma 3: Recall that, by Lemma 1, the process $X_{-\infty}^{\infty}$ is ergodic and stationary under $\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$.

Part (i). Consider a $\delta>0$ and an open cover $\{B(\theta, \delta): \theta \in \Theta\}$ where $B(\theta, \delta)$ is an open ball centered around $\theta$ with radius $\delta>0$. Since $\Theta$ is compact (Assumption 3), there exists a finite subcover $B_{j} \equiv B\left(\theta_{j}, \delta\right)$ with $j=1, \ldots, J$. Also note that, pointwise
in $\theta \in \Theta, \ell_{T}^{\nu}\left(X_{-\infty}^{T}, \theta\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{\prime}}\left[\ell_{T}^{\nu}\left(X_{-\infty}^{T}, \theta\right)\right] \rightarrow 0$ a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$ by the ergodic theorem and the fact that $X_{-\infty}^{\infty} \mapsto \ell_{T}^{\nu}\left(X_{-\infty}^{T}, \theta\right) \in L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{\theta^{*}}^{\nu}\right)$. Thus, it suffices to show that there exists a $T(j, \epsilon)$ such that, for all $t \geq T(j, \epsilon)$,

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left(l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)-E_{\vec{P}_{*}}\left[l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)\right]\right)>\epsilon\right) \leq \epsilon,
$$

where $l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right) \equiv \log \frac{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)}{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta_{j}\right)}$. Observe that, for any $j$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left(l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)\right]\right) \\
& \quad \leq \sum_{t=1}^{T} \sup _{\theta \in B_{j}}\left(l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[l_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}, \theta\right)\right]\right) \equiv \sum_{t=1}^{T} \bar{l}_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Moreover, observe that

$$
\sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} \log \frac{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)}{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta_{j}\right)} \leq \sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} \frac{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)}{p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta_{j}\right)}-1
$$

By Assumption 4(i), for any $\epsilon>0$ there exists a $\delta>0$ such that $E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} \frac{p^{v}\left(X_{0} \mid X_{-\infty}^{-1}, \theta\right)}{p^{\nu}\left(X_{0} \mid X_{-\infty}^{-1}, \theta_{j}\right)}\right] \leq$ $1+\epsilon$ for any $j \in\{1, \ldots, J\}$ and any $t$. Therefore, we can choose a $\delta>0$ such that

$$
E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\sup _{\theta \in B_{j}} \log \frac{p^{\nu}\left(X_{0} \mid X_{-\infty}^{-1}, \theta\right)}{p^{\nu}\left(X_{0} \mid X_{-\infty}^{-1}, \theta_{j}\right)}\right] \leq \epsilon / 4
$$

This in turn implies that $E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\bar{l}_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)\right] \leq \epsilon / 2$. This result and the ergodic theorem establish that $\lim _{T \rightarrow \infty} T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \bar{l}_{t}\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right) \leq \epsilon / 2$ a.s. $\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$. This implies the result in (11).

Part (ii). Follows directly from the ergodic theorem and the fact that $X_{-\infty}^{\infty} \mapsto \log p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid\right.$ $\left.X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta_{*}\right)$ is in $L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)$.
Q.E.D.

## SM.3. PROPERTIES OF $p_{\theta}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)$

For any $t \in \mathbb{N}_{0} \equiv \mathbb{N} \cup\{0\}$, any $X_{-\infty}^{t}$ and any $\theta \in \Theta, p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)$ is defined as $\liminf _{M \rightarrow \infty} p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-M}^{t-1}\right) ; p_{*}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}\right)$ is defined analogously.

Lemma 12: Suppose Assumptions 4(ii) and 5 hold. Then:
(1) For any $t \in \mathbb{N}_{0}, x \mapsto p^{\nu}\left(\cdot \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)$ and $x \mapsto p_{*}^{v}\left(\cdot \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}\right)$ are densities, a.s. $\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$.
(2) Suppose $\Theta$ is compact and that for each $n \in \mathbb{N}_{0}, \theta \mapsto p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-n}^{0}\right)$ is uniformly continuous a.s. $\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$. Then, for any $\theta_{0} \in \Theta$ and $\epsilon>0$, there exists a $\delta>0$ such that

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\sup _{\theta_{0} \in \Theta} \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\theta_{0}, \delta\right)}\left|p^{\nu}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-\infty}^{0}, \theta\right)-p^{\nu}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-\infty}^{0}, \theta_{0}\right)\right|>\epsilon\right)<\epsilon
$$

(3) Suppose $\Theta$ is compact and that for each $n \in \mathbb{N}_{0}, \theta \mapsto p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-n}^{0}\right)$ is uniformly continuous a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$. Suppose also that there exists functions $\left(x_{1}, x_{0}\right) \mapsto\left(\bar{p}\left(x_{0}, x_{1}\right), \underline{p}\left(x_{0}, x_{1}\right)\right)$
such that for any $p \in\left\{p_{\theta}: \theta \in \Theta\right\} \cup p_{*}, \underline{p}\left(x_{0}, x_{1}\right) \leq p\left(x_{0}, s, x_{1}\right) \leq \bar{p}\left(x_{0}, x_{1}\right)$ for all $s \in \mathbb{S}$, and $E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\bar{p}\left(X_{0}, X_{1}\right) / \underline{p}\left(X_{0}, X_{1}\right)\right]<\infty$. Then Assumptions 3 and 4 hold.

Proof: (1) We need to show that the functions integrate to 1 . By analogous steps to those in the proof of Lemma 11, it follows that

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \left|\int\left\{p^{\nu}\left(x \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(x \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right\} d x\right| \\
& \quad \leq \int \sum_{s} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, x\right) d x \limsup _{M \rightarrow \infty} \prod_{i=-n}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right) d x \\
& \quad=\prod_{i=-n}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right)|\mathbb{S}| .
\end{aligned}
$$

Since this holds for any $n$ such that $-n \leq t-1$, we can take averages and obtain, for any $\epsilon>0$, that

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\left(\frac{1}{M+1} \sum_{n=0}^{M}\left|\int p^{\nu}\left(x \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right) d x-1\right|>\epsilon\right) \\
& \quad \leq \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\frac{1}{M+1} \sum_{n=0}^{M} \prod_{i=-n}^{0}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right)|\mathbb{S}|>\epsilon\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Since this holds for any $M$, by taking $M \rightarrow \infty$, stationarity and Assumption 5 imply that the RHS vanishes. Thus, it follows that $\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\left(\left|\int p^{\nu}\left(x \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right) d x-1\right| \geq \epsilon\right)=0$. As the $\epsilon>0$ is arbitrary, this implies that $\int p^{\nu}\left(x \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right) d x=1$, a.s. $-\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$. Following the same logic, an analogous result can be established for $p_{*}^{\nu}\left(\cdot \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}\right)$.
(2) Similarly, for any $n$ such that $-n \leq t-1$,

$$
\sup _{\theta \in \Theta}\left|p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right| \leq \sum_{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right) \prod_{i=-n}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right)
$$

Hence, for any $\theta_{0}$ in $\Theta$,

\begin{aligned}
& \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\theta_{0}, \delta\right)}\left|p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-p^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-\infty}^{t-1}, \theta_{0}\right)\right| \\
& \leq \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\theta_{0}, \delta\right)} \sum_{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right) \frac{1}{1+M} \sum_{n=0}^{M} \prod_{i=-n}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right) \\
& \quad+\frac{1}{1+M} \sum_{n=0}^{M} \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\theta_{0}, \delta\right)}\left|p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}, \theta\right)-p_{\theta_{0}}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)\right|
\end{aligned}
$$

For any $\gamma>0$, choose $M$ such that $\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\frac{1}{1+M} \sum_{n=0}^{M} \prod_{i=-n}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right) \geq \gamma\right)<\gamma$; such $M$ exists by Assumption 5. Given such $M$, for any $\epsilon>0$ and any $\delta>0$, it follows that

Let $\delta>0$ be such that for each $n \in\{0, \ldots, M\}, \sup _{\theta_{0} \in \Theta} \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\theta_{0}, \delta\right)} \mid p_{\theta}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right)-$ $p_{\theta_{0}}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{-n}^{t-1}\right) \mid<0.5 \epsilon$ a.s. $\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$; such $\delta>0$ exists by our conditions. So the third term in the RHS is 0 . Also, under our conditions, it follows that $\sup _{\theta \in \Theta} p_{\theta}\left(X_{t-1}, s, X_{t}\right)=O_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)$, and thus the first term in the RHS can be made smaller than $\epsilon / 3$ by a suitably chosen $\gamma \in(0, \epsilon)$. Thus, the desired result holds.
(3) By the definition of $p^{\nu}(. \mid ., \theta)$, it follows that $p^{\nu}\left(X_{1} \mid X_{-\infty}^{0}, \theta\right) \leq \max _{s \in \mathbb{S}} p_{\theta}\left(X_{0}, s, X_{1}\right)$, and for some $n \in \mathbb{N}_{0}$,

and the RHS is in $L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)$. Thus, by part (2) and the dominated convergence theorem, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists a $\delta>0$ such that

Since the RHS is in $L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)$, the results in part (2) and the dominated convergence theorem imply that $\theta \mapsto H(\theta)$ is continuous.
Q.E.D.

## SM.4. SUFFICIENT CONDITIONS FOR ASSUMPTIONS 5 AND 8

By exploiting the fact that $\left(X_{t}\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$ is $\beta$-mixing and stationary, the following lemma provides sufficient conditions for Assumption 5.

Lemma 13: Suppose Assumptions 1 and 2 hold.
(1) Suppose further there exists $l \geq 1$ such that

(2) Suppose further $E_{\bar{P}_{v}^{*}}\left[\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{1}\right)\right)^{\frac{2 a}{1-a}}\right]<1$. Then Assumption 8 holds.

Proof: (1) By stationarity and the condition that $E\left[C\left(X_{-1}, X_{0}\right)^{l}\right]<\infty$, by Jensen's inequality (and the fact that $1 / l^{\prime} \leq 1$, where $1 / l+1 / l^{\prime}=1$ ), it suffices to show that

By employing well-known coupling results for $\beta$-mixing sequences (see Yu (1994)), it follows that ${ }^{24}$

$$

for any $q \in\{1, \ldots, t\}$. Therefore, for any $1 \leq m \leq T$,

T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} E_{\bar{P}_{\bar{v}}^{*}}\left[\prod_{i=0}^{t-1}\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{i}\right)\right)^{l^{\prime}}\right] \leq \frac{m}{T}+T^{-1} \sum_{t=m+1}^{T}\left\{\beta_{q} t / q+\left(E_{\bar{P}_{\bar{v}}^{*}}\left[\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{1}\right)\right)^{l^{\prime}}\right]\right)^{(t / q-1) / 2}\right\} .
$$

By Lemma 1, $\beta_{q}=\exp \{q \log \gamma\}$. This fact and the condition $E_{\bar{P}_{\bar{v}}^{*}}\left[\left(1-\underline{q}\left(X_{1}\right)\right)^{l^{\prime}}\right]<1$ imply that we can take, for instance, $q \equiv t^{1 / 2}$ and $m=\sqrt{T}$, so that the RHS vanishes as $T$ diverges.
(2) By our previous calculations,

## SM.5. PROOFS AND RESULTS FOR EXAMPLE 4

In what follows, $e_{\max }(M)$ and $e_{\min }(M)$ denote the maximal and minimal eigenvalues of a matrix $M$.

## Lemma 14: Assumption 2 holds.

Proof: For each $s \in \mathbb{S}$, we apply Theorem 3.3 in Douc, Fort, Moulines, and Soulier (2004). To do so, we first verify their Assumptions 3.3 and 3.4. In our case, $\epsilon \sim N(0, \Sigma(s))$, so their Assumption 3.3 is satisfied for any $z_{0}$ and $\gamma_{0}=1$. In their notation, $g(x) \equiv \mu(s)+$ $\Phi^{\top} x$. Observe that $\|g(x)\| \leq\|\mu(s)\|+e_{\max }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right)\|x\|$. By assumption, $e_{\max }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right) \equiv \gamma<1$ and

\|\mu(s)\| \leq\left(1-e_{\max }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right)\right)\|x\|\left(1-\|x\|^{-0.5}\right)
$$

for all $x$ such that $\|x\| \geq R_{0}$. Such an $R_{0}$ exists because $\|\mu(s)\|$ is bounded and $e_{\max }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right)<1$. This choice ensures that $\|g(x)\| \leq\|x\|\left(1-\|x\|^{0.5}\right)$, which in turn, ensures the validity of their Assumption 3.4 with $r=1$ and $\rho=0.5$. By their Theorem 3.3, Assumption 2(i) holds. Assumption 2(ii), (iii) is satisfied because $\inf _{x \in A} P_{*}(s, x, C) \geq$ $\int_{C} \inf _{x \in A} \underline{p}(x, a) d a$, and since $A$ is bounded, it follows that $\inf _{x \in A} \underline{p}(x, a) \geq \exp \{\tilde{D}+$ $\left.\left(x^{\prime}\right)^{T} \tilde{F} a+\tilde{G} a\right\}$, so the RHS plays the role of the measure $\varpi$, which clearly is such that $\varpi(A)>0$.
Q.E.D.

Let $\bar{\kappa} \equiv \max _{s \in \mathbb{S}} \sup _{\Sigma(s) \in \Theta} e_{\max }(\Sigma(s)) \quad$ and $\quad \underline{\kappa} \equiv \min _{s \in \mathbb{S}} \inf _{\Sigma(s) \in \Theta} e_{\min }(\Sigma(s)) ; \quad \bar{m}=$ $\max _{s \in \mathbb{S}} \sup _{\mu(s) \in \Theta}\|\mu(s)\| ; \bar{M}=\sup _{\Phi \in \Theta} e_{\max }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right) \quad$ and $\underline{M}=\min _{\Phi \in \Theta} e_{\min }\left(\Phi \Phi^{\top}\right) ; \bar{\kappa}_{*} \equiv$ $\max _{s \in \mathbb{S}} e_{\max }\left(\Sigma_{*}(s)\right)$ and $\underline{\kappa}_{*} \equiv \min _{s \in \mathbb{S}} e_{\min }\left(\Sigma_{*}(s)\right) ; \bar{m}_{*}=\max _{s \in \mathbb{S}}\left\|\mu_{*}(s)\right\| ; \bar{M}_{*}=e_{\max }\left(\Phi_{*} \Phi_{*}^{\top}\right)$ and $\underline{M}_{*}=e_{\min }\left(\Phi_{*} \Phi_{*}^{\top}\right)$. By the assumptions in the text, $\bar{\kappa}, \bar{\kappa}_{*}, \underline{\kappa}, \underline{\kappa}_{*}, \underline{M}, \bar{M}, \underline{M_{*}}, \bar{M}_{*}$ are all in $(0, \infty)$.

Lemma 15: There exists a $C \in[1, \infty)$ such that, for any $(x, y)$ and any $s$,

& \quad \geq C^{-1} \exp \left\{-0.5 \bar{\kappa}\left(\|y\|^{2}+\bar{M}\|x\|^{2}+2 \sqrt{\bar{M}}\|x\|\|y\|\right)-\bar{\kappa}(\|y\|+\sqrt{\bar{M}}\|x\|) \bar{m}\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

An analogous bound holds for $f_{\mathcal{N}}\left(\left(y-\Phi_{*}^{\top} x-\mu_{*}(s)\right) \Sigma_{*}^{-1 / 2}(s)\right)$.
PROOF: The proof involves lengthy but straightforward derivations and is thus omitted; for details, see Pouzo, Psaradakis, and Sola (2021).
Q.E.D.

Lemma 16: Suppose there exists a $l \geq 1$ such that $l \bar{\kappa}<l \underline{\kappa_{~}}+\underline{\kappa}_{*}$ and $l \bar{\kappa} \bar{M}<l \underline{\kappa} M+\underline{\kappa}_{*}$. Then

REMARK 1: Before going to the proof, we discuss the conditions in the lemma. They basically require that the "spread" of the eigenvalues of the matrices $\Sigma(\cdot)$ and $\Phi \Phi^{*}$ is not too large relative to the eigenvalues in $\Sigma_{*}(\cdot)$. This condition comes naturally since we are essentially requiring that the ratio of two exponential functions is integrable with respect to a Gaussian measure. For instance, if $\Sigma(\cdot), \Sigma_{*}(\cdot)$ and $\Phi \Phi^{\top}, \Phi_{*} \Phi_{*}^{\top}$ are matrices with eigenvalues bounded between $0<a$ and $a+\Delta$, then sufficient conditions are given by $l \Delta<a$ and $l\left(2 a \Delta+(\Delta)^{2}\right)<a$, which is equivalent to $\frac{l \Delta^{2}}{1-2 l \Delta}<a$. $\Delta$

PROOF: It is enough to show that

E_{\bar{P}_{v}^{*}}\left[T_{3}(X, Y)\right] & \equiv E_{\bar{P}_{v}^{*}}\left[\exp \left\{-0.5 l\left(b_{2}-a_{2}\right)\|X\|^{2}+l\left(b_{5}+a_{5}\right)\|X\|\right\}\right]<\infty, \\
& {\left.\left[\exp \left\{l\left(b_{3}+a_{3}\right)\|X\|\|Y\|\right)\right\}\right]<\infty }
\end{aligned}
$$

For any $d \in\{1,2\}$, suppose there exists $\varphi$ such that $\int T_{d}(b) p_{*}(x, s, b) d b \leq \varphi(x) T_{d}(x)$ for any $x$, and, for any $\gamma>0,\{x: \varphi(x) \geq \gamma\}$ is either empty or compact. Then, for any $\gamma>0$,

\begin{aligned}
\int T_{d}(x) \nu(d x)= & \int 1\{\varphi(x) \leq \gamma\} T_{d}(x) \nu(d x)+\int 1\{\varphi(x)>\gamma\} T_{d}(x) \nu(d x) \\
= & \iint 1\{\varphi(x) \leq \gamma\} T_{d}(b) p_{*}(x, s, b) d b \nu(d x, d s) \\
& +\int 1\{\varphi(x)>\gamma\} T_{d}(x) \nu(d x) \\
\leq & \gamma \int T_{d}(x) \nu(d x)+\sup _{x: \varphi(x) \geq \gamma} T_{d}(x)
\end{aligned}
$$

where the second line follows because $\nu$ is the invariant probability distribution. Since $\{x: \varphi(x) \geq \gamma\}$ is bounded and compact (if it is nonempty), $\sup _{x: \varphi(x) \geq \gamma} T_{d}(x) \leq M<\infty$. Choosing $\gamma<1$, it follows that $\int T_{d}(x) \nu(d x) \leq \frac{M}{1-\gamma}<\infty$, as desired.

We now show that $\int T_{1}(b) p_{*}(x, s, b) d b \leq \varphi(x) T_{1}(x)$ for any $x$. To do this, note that

= & \int \exp \left\{0.5\left(l(\bar{\kappa}-\underline{\kappa})-\underline{\kappa}_{*}\right)\|y\|^{2}+\underline{\kappa}_{*} \sqrt{\bar{M}_{*}}\|x\|\|y\|+\left(\underline{\kappa}_{*} \bar{m}_{*}+l(\bar{\kappa}+\underline{\kappa})\right)\|y\|\right\} d y .
\end{aligned}
$$

By our conditions, $l(\bar{\kappa}-\underline{\kappa})-\underline{\kappa}_{*}<0$. Hence, the expression above is an integral of an exponential function of a quadratic form with negative leading coefficient, and is thus finite. Moreover, after some algebra, there exists a finite constant $C$, such that $\left.\int T_{1}(b) p_{*}(x, s, y) d y \leq C B_{*}(x) \exp \left\{\underline{\kappa}_{*} \sqrt{\bar{M}_{*}}\|x\| /\left(-\left(l(\bar{\kappa}-\underline{\kappa})-\underline{\kappa}_{*}\right)\right)\right\}\right)$; we redefine the RHS as $\left.C B_{*}(x) \exp \left\{D \underline{\kappa}_{*} \sqrt{\bar{M}_{*}}\|x\|\right\}\right)$ with $D>0$. Therefore, the result holds with

The case for $d=2$ is analogous and is thus omitted; for this case, we use the restriction that $l \bar{\kappa} \bar{M}<l \underline{\kappa} M+\underline{\kappa}_{*}$, instead of $l(\bar{\kappa}-\underline{\kappa})-\underline{\kappa}_{*}<0$.

Finally, observe that, if $\int T_{3}(x, y) p_{*}(x, s, y) \nu(d x, d s) d y \leq C \int \exp \left\{c_{1}\|x\|\right\} \nu(d x)$ for some $c_{1}<\infty$, then we can follow the same approach as before to show that $\int T_{3}(x, y) \times$ $p_{*}(x, s, y) \nu(d x, d s) d y<\infty$. Observe that, by the same calculations as before,

\end{aligned}

By Lemma 21(i), for $i \in\{1,2\}, \operatorname{Term}_{i} \precsim\left(\sum_{j=[k-T / 2]}^{k-1} \varrho(j, k-T)\right)$.
Part (ii). By part (i) and Lemma 17,

Proof of Lemma 9: To simplify the exposition, we present the proof for the case where $\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)$ is a scalar; since the dimension of this quantity is finite, the vector case follows readily from the results below.

Part (a) follows easily from Lemma 17 in the Supplemental Material SM.7.1.
For part (b), it follows from part (a) that $\Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)$ depends only on $\left(X_{t-\bar{L}}, \ldots, X_{t+j}\right)$. By Lemma $1,\left(X_{t}\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$ is $\beta$-mixing. Since, for any fixed $j$, the $\sigma$-algebra generated by $\left(\Delta_{s+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \Delta_{s,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right)_{s \leq t}$ is contained in the $\sigma$-algebra generated by $\left(X_{s+j}\right)_{s \leq t}$, and the $\sigma$-algebra generated by $\left(\Delta_{s+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \Delta_{s,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right)_{s \geq t}$ is contained in the $\sigma$-algebra generated by $\left(X_{s}\right)_{s \geq t-\bar{L}}$, it follows that, for each $j,\left(\Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$ is also $\beta$-mixing with mixing coefficients that decay at rate $O\left(\gamma^{n-2 \bar{L}}\right)$ as $n$ diverges through the positive integers; as $\bar{L}$ is taken to be fixed, the decay rate is $O\left(\gamma^{n}\right)$. As is well known, this result implies that the corresponding $\alpha$-mixing coefficients $\left(\alpha_{n}\right)_{n}$ decay at the same rate, that is, $\alpha_{n}=O\left(\gamma^{n}\right)$ for all $n$.

Henceforth, let $\Omega_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \equiv \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)$ and $\bar{\Omega}_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \equiv$ $\Omega_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}}\left[\Omega_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]$, for any $t, j$. Observe that, for any $j$,

\end{aligned}

for any $j$ (the implicit constant in the display does not depend on $j$ ). Thus, for any $j$,

& +2 T^{-1} \sum_{t=0}^{T-1}(1-t / T)\left(\alpha_{t}\right)^{2 /(2+2 \delta)} \sqrt{E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\left(\bar{\Omega}_{j, 0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right)^{2}\right]} \\
& \times\left(E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\left|\bar{\Omega}_{j+m, m,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right|^{2+2 \delta}\right]\right)^{1 /(2+2 \delta)}

E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\left(\bar{\Omega}_{j, 0,-\infty}\left(\theta^{*}\right)\right)^{2}\right] \precsim E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)^{4}\right],
$$

which is bounded by assumption. In addition, by similar calculations,

$$
E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\left(\bar{\Omega}_{j, 0,-\infty}\left(\theta^{*}\right)\right)^{2+2 \delta}\right] \precsim E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)^{4+4 \delta}\right] \quad \forall j,
$$

which is bounded by assumption. Therefore, there exists a finite constant $C$ (which does not depend on $j$ ) such that

$$
E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\left(T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \bar{\Omega}_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta^{*}\right)\right)^{2}\right] \leq C\left(T^{-1}+2 T^{-1} \sum_{t=0}^{T-1}(1-t / T)\left(\alpha_{t}\right)^{2 /(2+2 \delta)}\right)
$$

As $\alpha_{t}=O\left(\gamma^{t}\right)$, it follows that $\sum_{t=0}^{T-1}(1-t / T)\left(\alpha_{t}\right)^{2 /(2+2 \delta)}=O\left(\sum_{t=0}^{T-1}(1-t / T)\left(\gamma^{2 /(2+2 \delta)}\right)^{t}\right)$. Since $\gamma<1$, it follows that $\sum_{t=0}^{T-1}(1-t / T)\left(\alpha_{t}\right)^{2 /(2+2 \delta)}=O(1)$, which in turn implies that $E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{\prime}}\left[\left(T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \bar{\Omega}_{t+j, t,-\infty}\left(\theta^{*}\right)\right)^{2}\right] \leq C T^{-1}$. Hence, by the Markov inequality, for any $a>0$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\max _{j \in\{0, \ldots, L\}} \| T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}\right. \\
& \left.-E_{\vec{P}_{*}^{*}}\left[\Delta_{j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{j}\right) \Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)^{\top}\right] \| \geq a\right) \\
& \leq \sum_{j=0}^{L} \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\| T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}\right. \\
& \left.-E_{\vec{P}_{*}}\left[\Delta_{j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{j}\right) \Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)^{\top}\right] \| \geq a\right) \\
& \leq C a^{-2} L T^{-1},
\end{aligned}
$$

which implies the desired result.

## SM.8. PROOF OF THEOREM 5

To prove Theorem 5, we use the following results, whose proofs are relegated to the end of this section. The following lemma shows that we can "quantify" convergence in probability.

Lemma 24: Suppose a random sequence $\left.X_{T}\right)_{T=0}^{\infty}$ converges to zero in probability. Then there exists a deterministic positive sequence $\left(r_{T}\right)_{T=0}^{\infty}$ such that $r_{T}=o(1)$, and for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $T_{\epsilon}$ such that

\operatorname{Pr}\left(\left|X_{T}\right| \geq r_{T}\right) \leq \epsilon
$$

for all $T \geq T_{\epsilon}$. In particular, $\left|X_{T}\right|=O_{\mathrm{Pr}}\left(r_{T}\right)$.
The next lemma presents some useful properties for the "score process."
Lemma 25: Under the Assumptions of Theorem 5, the following are true:

1. $\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{0,-\infty}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)}<\infty(\delta>0$ is as in Assumption 7).
2. $\Delta_{t,-\infty}$ and $\Delta_{t,-\infty} \Delta_{0,-\infty}^{\top}$ are continuous in $L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)$-norm, that is, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $\delta>0$ such that

$$
\max _{t}\left\|\sup _{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta}\right\| \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta) \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)^{\top}-\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)^{\top}\| \|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq \epsilon
$$

and

$$
\ddot{\varpi}(\delta) \equiv \max _{t}\left\|\sup _{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta}\right\| \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta) \Delta_{0,-\infty}(\theta)^{\top}-\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right) \Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)^{\top}\| \|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\bar{P}}\right)} \leq \epsilon .
$$

3. There exists a constant $C<\infty$ such that, for any $t$ and $M$,

$$
\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\Delta_{t, t-M}(\theta)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq C M^{1-1 / p}
$$

Moreover, by Assumption $8, p \in(0,2 / 3)$, and thus the RHS vanishes as $M$ diverges.
Proof of Theorem 5: The proof has several parts and steps.
Part (A). We show that

$$
\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \nabla_{\theta}^{2} \log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{0}^{t-1}, \hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)
$$

We do this by using the triangle inequality and showing the following:

\lim _{T \rightarrow \infty}\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\nabla_{\theta}^{2} \log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(\cdot \mid \cdot, \hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-\xi_{t}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\}\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)}=0
$$

(which implies convergence in probability), $\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\xi_{t}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-\xi_{t}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\}\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)$, and $\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \xi_{t}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)$.

The first expression holds true because by Theorem 1 , for any $\delta^{\prime} \leq \delta, \hat{\theta}_{\nu, T} \in B\left(\delta^{\prime}, \theta_{*}\right)$ w.p.a.1, and hence, by Lemma 8, the desired result follows.

Regarding the second expression, again by Theorem $1, \hat{\theta}_{\nu, T} \in B\left(\delta^{\prime}, \theta_{*}\right)$ w.p.a.1. Thus, by the Markov inequality and stationarity, it follows that, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $T(\epsilon)$ such that, for any $t \geq T(\epsilon)$,

$$
\left.\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\xi_{t}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-\xi_{t}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\}\right\| \geq \epsilon\right) \leq \epsilon^{-1} E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}} \sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta^{\prime}, \theta_{*}\right)}\left\|\xi_{1}(\theta)-\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\|\right]+0.5 \epsilon
$$

By Lemma 8, $\xi_{1}$ is continuous, and thus uniformly continuous over compact sets. Since $\delta^{\prime}>0$ can be chosen to be any number less than $\delta$ ( $\delta$ as in Assumption 7), we can choose it so that the first term in the RHS is less than $0.5 \epsilon$. Hence, the desired follows.

Finally, ergodicity of $X_{-\infty}^{\infty}$ (Lemma 1) implies ergodicity of $\left(\xi_{t}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right)_{t=-\infty}^{\infty}$; therefore, by Lemma 8 and Birkhoff's ergodic theorem, $\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \xi_{t}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)$. Hence,

\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \nabla_{\theta}^{2} \log p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{0}^{t-1}, \hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1) .
$$

With this result and the Fisher information equality (established in the proof of Corollary 1), the result of part (a) of the theorem follows.

PART (B). STEP 1 To prove part (b), it suffices to show that $\left\|E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\xi_{1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]-H_{T}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\|=$ $o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}(1)$ and $\left\|\Sigma_{T}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-J_{T}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}(1)$.

The first expression was established in Part (A). Regarding the second expression, we introduce some notation. For any $\theta \in \Theta$, let

\Omega_{t, l, M}(\theta) \equiv \Delta_{t, M}(\theta)\left(X_{M}^{t}\right) \Delta_{l, M}(\theta)\left(X_{M}^{l}\right)^{\top}, \quad \forall t, l, M \in \mathbb{N}

where it is left implicit that this quantity depends on $X_{-M}^{\max \{t, l\}}$. Also,

\theta \mapsto \hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau, 0}(\theta) \equiv(T-\tau)^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-\tau} \Omega_{t+\tau, t, 0}(\theta), \quad \forall \tau \in\left\{1, \ldots, L_{T}\right\}
$$

Recall that $\Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right)=\nabla_{\theta} p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{0}^{t-1}, \theta\right)$, so $\hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau, 0}(\theta)$ is the sample covariance of $\Omega_{t+\tau, t, 0}(\theta)$.

Given this notation, observe that

\Sigma_{T}\left(\theta_{*}\right)=T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Omega_{t, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]+T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \sum_{l=0}^{t-1}\left\{E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Omega_{t, l,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]+E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\Omega_{t, l,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)^{\top}\right]\right\}
$$

The aim is to show that each of the summands above is well approximated by its counterpart in $J_{T}$. For the first summand, we show in Step 2 below that

$$
\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\Omega_{t, t, 0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\Omega_{t, t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]\right\}\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}(1) .

Regarding the second summand, we observe that, for any $t \geq l, E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Omega_{t, l,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right]=$ $E_{\vec{P}_{*}}\left[\Omega_{t-l, 0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right] \equiv \gamma_{t-l}\left(\theta_{*}\right)$ (the first equality, which follows from stationarity, can be established by analogous arguments to those presented at the beginning of Step 2). Hence,

Thus, it suffices to show that

\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T-1}} \omega(j, L) \hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1,0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, v}\right)\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)
$$

the proof of which is in Step 3 below.
STEP 2 We now show that

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\Delta_{t, 0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right) \Delta_{t, 0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X^{t}\right)^{\top}-E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}\left[\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}\right]\right\}\right\| \\
& \quad=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)
\end{aligned}
$$

where, by the definition of $\Delta_{t, M}, \Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)\left(X^{t}\right)=\nabla_{\theta} \log p_{t}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{0}^{t-1}, \theta\right)$.
First, observe that

$$
E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}\right]=E_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}\left[\Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right) \Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{0}\right)^{\top}\right] .
$$

This follows from stationarity (see Lemma 1) and the fact that $\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)$ can be approximated (uniformly in $t$ ) by $\Delta_{t, t-M}\left(\theta_{*}\right)$ (see Lemma 18). Hence, it suffices to show that

& \quad=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1) .
\end{aligned}
$$

By Lemma 1, ergodicity of $\Delta_{t, t-M}\left(\theta_{*}\right)$ for any $M$ follows. This, Birkhoff's ergodic theorem, and Lemma 18 imply that

where, for any $M \in \mathbb{Z} \cup\{\infty\}, \bar{\Delta}_{M}(\theta)\left(X_{t-M}^{t}\right) \equiv \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)\left(X_{t-M}^{t}\right) \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)\left(X_{t-M}^{t}\right)^{\top}$.
Hence, in order to obtain the desired result it suffices to show that

\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\bar{\Delta}_{t}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right)-\bar{\Delta}_{\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)\right\}\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{u}}(1) .
$$

In order to do so, by the triangle inequality, it is sufficient to show that

\begin{equation*}
\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\bar{\Delta}_{\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)-\bar{\Delta}_{\infty}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)\right\}\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1) \tag{18}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\{\bar{\Delta}_{t}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right)-\bar{\Delta}_{\infty}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)\right\}\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1) . \tag{19}
\end{equation*}
$$

Expression (18) holds by Lemma 25, the fact that, for any $\delta>0, \hat{\theta}_{T, \nu} \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)$ w.p.a.1$\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$ (by Theorem 1), and the Markov inequality. Regarding expression (19), by the Markov inequality and the fact that $\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu} \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)$ w.p.a. $1-\bar{P}_{*}^{v}$ (by Theorem 1 ), it is sufficient to show that

The LHS is bounded by

& T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T}\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)-\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{*}\right)} \\
& \quad \times\left(\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)}+\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{*}\right)}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

By Lemma 25(3), the first term in the RHS is bounded (up to constants) by $T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} t^{1-1 / p}$. The second term in the RHS is bounded by Lemma 25(1). Thus, under Assumption 8, the whole expression converges to zero and the desired result follows.

STEP 3. We next show that, for any $L \equiv L_{T}$ such that $\lim _{T \rightarrow \infty} L_{T}=\infty$ and $L_{T}\left(\ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T+r_{T}+T^{-1 / 2}\right)=o(1)$,

$$

where, for any $\tau \in\left\{1, \ldots, L_{T}\right\}$ and any $M \leq 1$,

$$
\theta \mapsto \hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau, M}(\theta) \equiv T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-\tau} \Delta_{t+\tau, M}(\theta)\left(X_{M}^{t+\tau}\right) \Delta_{t, M}(\theta)\left(X_{M}^{t}\right)^{\top}
$$

(recall that $\left.\Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right)=\nabla_{\theta} p_{t}^{\nu}\left(X_{t} \mid X_{0}^{t-1}, \theta\right)\right)$.
Putting $\hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau} \equiv \hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau,-\infty}$, we have, by the triangle inequality, that $\| \sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \times$ $\gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T}-1} \omega(j, L) \hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1,0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu}\right) \|$ is bounded by

\begin{aligned}
& \left\|\sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T}-1} \omega(j, L) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\|+\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T-1}} \omega(j, L)\left\{\gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\}\right\| \\
& \quad+\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T}-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu}\right)\right\}\right\| \\
& \quad+\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T-1}} \omega(j, L)\left\{\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1,0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu}\right)\right\}\right\|
\end{aligned}
$$

We now bound each term in the RHS individually.
By assumption, for any $l \geq 0,\left\|\gamma_{l}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \leq v(l)$, and thus, for any $L$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \left\|\sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \\
& \quad \leq \sum_{j=L}^{\infty} v(j)+\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1}\{(1-j / T)-\omega(j, L)\} \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\|
\end{aligned}
$$

Since, $v$ is integrable, the first term in the RHS converges to zero as $L$ diverges. Furthermore, since $\omega(\cdot, \cdot)$ is bounded, $\left\|\gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \leq v(j+1)$, which is integrable, and $(1-j / T)-\omega(j, L)$ converges to zero pointwise in $j$ as $T$ (and thus $L=L_{T}$ ) diverges, so by the dominated convergence theorem, the second term also converges to zero as $T$ (and thus $L=L_{T}$ ) diverges. Therefore, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $T_{\epsilon}$ such that, for all $T \geq T_{\epsilon}$,

$$
\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T}-1} \omega\left(j, L_{T}\right) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \leq \epsilon
$$

We now consider, for any $\delta>0$,

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-j} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}-\gamma_{j}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\}\right\| \geq \delta\right)
$$

Since $\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L) \leq L$, this expression is bounded above by

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\max _{j \in\left\{0, \ldots, L_{T}\right\}}\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-j} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}-\gamma_{j}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \geq \delta / L\right) .
$$

By similar arguments to those presented in Step 2 and Birkhoff's ergodic theorem, for each $L$,

$$
\max _{j \in\{0, \ldots, L\}}\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-j} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}-\gamma_{j}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\|=o_{\bar{P}_{*}^{v}}(1)
$$

By Lemma 24, for each $L$, there exists a positive sequence $\left(r_{T}\right)_{T}$ such that $r_{T}=o(1)$ and $\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\max _{j \epsilon\{0, \ldots, L\}}\left\|T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}-\gamma_{j}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\| \geq r_{T}\right)=o(1)$. Thus, by setting $\delta=2 r_{T} L$, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $T_{\epsilon}$ such that, for all $T \geq T_{\epsilon}$,

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-j} \Delta_{t+j,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t+j}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\left(X_{-\infty}^{t}\right)^{\top}-\gamma_{j}\left(\theta_{*}\right)\right\}\right\| \geq 2 r_{T} L\right) \leq \epsilon
$$

By Theorem 4, $\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T} \in B\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T, \theta_{*}\right)$ w.p.a.1- $\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}$. Hence, for any $\epsilon>0$ there exists $T_{\epsilon}$ such that for all $T \geq T_{\epsilon}$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\}\right\| \geq L \ddot{\boldsymbol{w}}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T\right) \\
& \quad \leq \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\sup _{\theta \in B\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T, \theta_{*}\right)} \sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\|\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}(\theta)\right\|\right. \\
& \left.\quad \geq L \ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T\right)+\epsilon .
\end{aligned}
$$

Moreover, by the Markov inequality,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \bar{P}_{*}^{v}\left(\sum_{\theta \in B\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T, \theta_{*}\right)} \sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\|\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}(\theta)\right\| \geq L \ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T\right) \\
& \quad \leq \frac{\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L) \ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right)}{L \ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T},
\end{aligned}
$$

where the last line follows from Lemma 25 and $\tilde{\Delta}_{t,-M}(\theta) \equiv \Delta_{t,-M}(\theta) \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)^{\top}$ for any $t \in\{0, \ldots, T, \ldots\}$ and $M \in \mathbb{N} \cup\{\infty\}$. Since $\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L) / L \leq 1$, the last expression is less than $\epsilon$ for sufficiently large $T$. Thus,

$$
\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\left(\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\}\right\| \geq L \ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T\right) \leq \epsilon
$$

Finally, since, for any $\tau \in\{1, \ldots, L\}, \theta \mapsto \hat{\gamma}_{T, \tau, 0}(\theta) \equiv T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-\tau} \Delta_{t+\tau, 0}(\theta)\left(X_{0}^{t+\tau}\right) \times$ $\Delta_{t, 0}(\theta)\left(X_{0}^{t}\right)^{\top}$, by Lemma 25(3) (with $M=t$ ),

$$
\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L)\left\{\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)-\hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1,0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{\nu, T}\right)\right\}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)} \precsim \sum_{j=0}^{L-1} \omega(j, L) T^{-1} \sum_{t=1}^{T-j} t^{1-1 / p} .
$$

By the proof of Lemma 18, $T^{-1 / 2} \sum_{t=1}^{T} t^{1-1 / p}$ vanishes; thus, the RHS is of order $o\left(L T^{-1 / 2}\right)$.
Therefore, we have shown that, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $T_{\epsilon}$ such that, for all $T \geq T_{\epsilon}$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\left(\left\|\sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T-1}} \omega(j, L) \hat{\gamma}_{T, j+1,0}\left(\hat{\theta}_{T, \nu}\right)\right\|\right. \\
& \left.\quad \geq \epsilon+L_{T}\left(\ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T+2 r_{T}+T^{-1 / 2}\right)\right) \leq \epsilon
\end{aligned}
$$

where the $\epsilon$ inside the probability arises from bounding $\| \sum_{j=0}^{T-1}(1-j / T) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right)-$ $\sum_{j=0}^{L_{T}-1} \omega\left(j, L_{T}\right) \gamma_{j+1}\left(\theta_{*}\right) \|$ and requires $L_{T}$ to diverge. Therefore, by taking $L \equiv L_{T}$ such that $\lim _{T \rightarrow \infty} L_{T}=\infty$ and $L_{T}\left(\ddot{\varpi}\left(T^{-1 / 2} \log \log T\right) \log \log T+r_{T}+T^{-1 / 2}\right)=o(1)$, we establish the desired result.
Q.E.D.

Proof of Lemma 24: The proof is standard, and thus omitted; it can be found in Pouzo, Psaradakis, and Sola (2021).
Q.E.D.

Proof of Lemma 25: We show that $\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{0,-\infty}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\bar{*}}\right)}$ is bounded ( $\delta$ is as in Assumption 7) and that $\Delta_{t,-\infty}$ and $\Delta_{t,-\infty} \Delta_{0,-\infty}$ are continuous in $L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)$ norm, that is, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists $\delta>0$ such that

\omega(\delta) \equiv \max _{t}\left\|_{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta}\left\{\Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta) \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)^{\top}-\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right) \Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)^{\top}\right\}\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq \epsilon \tag{20}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\ddot{\varpi}(\delta) \equiv \max _{t}\left\|\sup _{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta}\left\{\Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta) \Delta_{0,-\infty}(\theta)^{\top}-\Delta_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right) \Delta_{0,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)^{\top}\right\}\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq \epsilon \tag{21}
\end{equation*}
$$

We also show that there exist a constant $C<\infty$ such that, for any $t$ and $M$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\Delta_{t, t-M}(\theta)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq C M^{1-1 / p} \tag{22}
\end{equation*}
$$

By Assumption $8, p \in(0,2 / 3)$ so the RHS vanishes as $M$ diverges. We first establish (22). To do so, note that, by inspection of the proof of Lemma 18, the conclusion of that lemma holds uniformly in $\theta$ (and also in $t$ ), that is,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\Delta_{t, t-M}(\theta)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{*}\right)} \precsim \sum_{j=[t-M / 2]}^{t-1} \varrho(j, t-M)+\sum_{j=[t-M]}^{[t-M / 2]-1} \varrho(t-1, j) \tag{23}
\end{equation*}
$$

By the definition of $\varrho$ and stationarity, we have that, for any $j \geq k, \varrho(j, k)=\varrho(j-k, 0)$, and thus $\sum_{j=[t-M / 2]}^{t-1} \varrho(j, t-M) \leq \int_{[M / 2]+1}^{M} 1 /(x)^{1 / p} d x \leq \frac{p}{1-p}(M / 2)^{1-1 / p}$, and $\sum_{j=[t-M]}^{[t-M / 2]-1} \varrho(t-1-j, 0) \leq \frac{p}{1-p}(M / 2)^{1-1 / p}$. Thus,

$$
\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\Delta_{t, t-M}(\theta)\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \precsim M^{1-1 / p}
$$

as desired. Since, under Assumption 7, $\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)}<\infty$ for any finite $M$, (22) implies that $\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{0,-\infty}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{\nu}\right)}$ is bounded.

We show next that (21) holds (the proof of (20) is completely analogous so it is omitted). To this end, observe that, for any $t \in \mathbb{N} \cup\{0\}$ and $M \in \mathbb{N} \cup\{\infty\}$,

\left\|\sup _{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta} \tilde{\Delta}_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\tilde{\Delta}_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \leq & \left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \tilde{\Delta}_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\tilde{\Delta}_{t, t-M}(\theta)\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \\
& +\| \|_{\left\{\left\|\theta-\theta_{0}\right\|<\delta\right\} \cap B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \sup _{t, t-M}(\theta)-\tilde{\Delta}_{t, t-M}\left(\theta_{0}\right) \|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \\
& +\left\|\sup _{\theta_{0} \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)} \tilde{\Delta}_{t,-\infty}\left(\theta_{0}\right)-\tilde{\Delta}_{t, t-M}\left(\theta_{0}\right)\right\|_{L^{1}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)} \\
\equiv & \operatorname{Term}_{1, t, M}+\operatorname{Term}_{2, t, M}+\operatorname{Term}_{3, t, M}
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\tilde{\Delta}_{t,-M}(\theta) \equiv \Delta_{t,-M}(\theta) \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)^{\top}$. We now bound each of these terms.
Regarding terms 1 and 3, by simple algebra and the fact that

$$
\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{0,-M}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)}<\infty
$$

for any $M \in \mathbb{N} \cup\{\infty\}$,

$$
\operatorname{Term}_{1, t, M}+\operatorname{Term}_{3, t, M} \leq C\left\|\sup _{\theta \in B\left(\delta, \theta_{*}\right)}\right\| \Delta_{t,-\infty}(\theta)-\Delta_{t, t-M}(\theta)\| \|_{L^{2}\left(\bar{P}_{*}^{v}\right)},
$$

for some $C<\infty$, and, by (22), the RHS is bounded by $O\left(M^{1-1 / p}\right)$. Therefore, under Assumption 8 , for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists an $M$ such that, uniformly over $t, \operatorname{Term}_{1, t, M}+$ $\operatorname{Term}_{3, t, M} \leq \epsilon$. Henceforth, fix this $M$.

Regarding term 2, observe that $M<\infty$ and that $\tilde{\Delta}_{t, t-M}$ is the product of two functions that are comprised of $M$-term-sums of products of $\theta \mapsto \log p_{\theta}\left(x, s, x^{\prime}\right), \theta \mapsto$ $\log Q_{\theta}\left(x, s, x^{\prime}\right)$ and their derivatives, all of which are continuous functions by Assumption 6. Thus, it can be shown that $\Delta_{t, t-M}$ is continuous, thereby implying that, for any $\epsilon>0$, there exists some $\delta_{M, \epsilon}$ (which could always be chosen to be smaller than $\delta>0$ ) such that $\operatorname{Term}_{2, t, M}<\epsilon$. This completes the proof.
Q.E.D.
